Operations Level Course for Vehicle Extrication. It is geared toward both beginners and more experienced rescue workers, as it includes reviews of new vehicle technology; including anatomy, airbags, pre-tensioners, and hybrid vehicles. Students will participate in both classroom lecture/discussion and in hands on, putting the lessons learned inside to work. They will learn techniques designed to take advantage and conquer today's vehicles. Hands on will include scenarios with vehicles on their tires, side, and on their top. PT care and removal will also be addressed during this class. These hours can be applied to EMS recertification hours.

This class is intended for all disciplines at all levels of experience. We encourage a lot of interaction and a very open-minded attitude. This classes goals are to provide vital information in all phases of a traffic incident.

Chiefs Toolbox #5—Finances & American Command ~ Friday Only

Chief Dan Woodson and Chief Bobby Halton

Chiefs Toolbox #5—Finances; the participants will:

Identify sources that can be used to fund programs, Understand elements of budget preparation, Explain strategies which can be used to justify/sell a budget, Understand how to develop a spending plan, Identify important elements of purchasing/bidding processes, Demonstrate how to read and understand financial statements, Understand how to prepare for, read, interpret, and respond to an audit.

American Command is a unique course taught by Chief Halton that covers the basics of command. Not command as a fireground function but command as a way of life for the American fire officer and senior firefighter. Officers learn the art of command from their seniors in their first days as firefighters and cadets. Learning how to counsel, advance skills and knowledge in the art and science of firefighting is the basis of command. In this interactive program chief Halton will cover an overview of the command phenomena, students will participate in analysis of today's field issues look at a list of major trends in each topic, discuss potential research work and books on those specific topics and engage in reflection and discussion regarding command issues the American fire service.

Recruitment and Retention ~ Saturday

Matt Aalto, Stayton Fire District

Topics of today's Fire Service will include: Who is volunteering? Why they are volunteering and why they don't volunteer. How to make a recruitment plan and implement it in your department? Discussion will focus on gaps in implementation and how to improve the plan with common that can hinder a department progression. Emphasis be on how to form partnerships and use resources that can build and strengthening your overall departments. This presentation will provide an overview of Recruitment and Retention practices with hands on application.

Advanced Fire Behavior ~ Wednesday/Thursday

After completion of this course, the student will be able to demonstrate basic understanding of the fire environment in order to learn Intermediate Fire Behavior concepts. This class will count towards the chemistry portion of Fire Officer 1.

Days: 2 days—Wednesday & Thursday Class Size: Minimum 8, Maximum 25 students

Certification: This class will count towards the chemistry portion of Fire Officer 1.

Incident Safety Officer ~ Thursday/Friday

Devon Wells, Hood River Fire/Emergency Service Training & Consulting

This two-day course examines the Safety Officer's role at emergency responses. A specific focus on operations within an Incident Command System (ICS) as a Safety Officer is a main theme. Response to all-hazards types of situations will be emphasized. Individuals who have a Safety Officer responsibility at emergency operation situations. Individuals attending this course should have a working knowledge of ICS as taught by the National Fire Academy, building construction principles, hazardous materials management, applicable National Fire Protection Association guidelines, and federal regulations.

Days: 2 days—Thursday & Friday

Class Size: Minimum 8, Maximum 30 students

DPSST Certification: Meets requirements for Fire Ground Leader and Fire Officer.

Requirements: None

Basic Fire Investigation 16F002~ Thursday/Friday

Dan Jones, Russ Jones, Shannon Miller, Jason Cane, Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal

Basic Fire Investigation provides basic fire investigation training for firefighters and fire officers, often combined with a live fire burn and practical fire investigation techniques. The BFI 200 level is a 2 day (16 hour) course. This is a DPSST certified course for fire prevention portions of the NFPA Fire Investigation Task Book for practical and knowledge JPR's.

Day: 2 days—Thursday & Friday

Class Size: Minimum 12, Maximum 25 students

Requirements: Note taking materials

Hazmat Incident Commander ~ Friday/Saturday

Bill Henle, Henle Hazmat Training and Consulting, Retired from Portland Fire

This 2 day class utilizes a "practical approach" for commanding a Hazardous Materials/WMD Incident. The class provides tools for the IC to successfully analyze and command Hazardous Materials/WMD emergencies with an in-depth session on how to interface with a hazmat team. Utilizing actual case histories with many being transportation related and in-class group scenarios, the class presents a "real world" perspective in properly commanding a Hazardous Materials/WMD incident. The Instructor brings over 35 years of hazmat response experience to the classroom with personal experience in many of the case histories. OSHA requires that anyone in charge of a Hazmat/WMD incident have additional training. This class provides the knowledge to meet the OSHA requirements.

Topics include: Legal and Mandated IC Responsibilities, Building Appropriate Command Structures, Scene Hazard and Risk Analysis, Hazmat Tactics and Strategies, Hazmat Rescue Evacuation/Shelter In-Place Hazmat Fires

Days: 2 days—Friday & Saturday

Class Size: Minimum 10, Maximum 30 students

Requirements: Students should have at a minimum Hazmat Operations Level training as a pre-requisite

Class provides DPSST Certification

Farm Rescue/Heavy Equipment Rescue ~ Friday/Saturday

Bill Alguire, Sheridan Fire District; Chris Mills, Holmatro

This two-day course will cover the classifications and anatomy of industrial and agricultural vehicles, size-up considerations when responding to agricultural incidents, proper procedures for stabilizing farm machinery, and gaining access to and extrication of farm machinery incidents. Participants will be given opportunities to use these techniques in practical applications.

Days: 2 days—Friday & Saturday

Class Size: Minimum 8, Maximum 25 students

Requirements: Full PPE/turnouts

Pre-requisites: Students should have completed Vehicle Extrication prior to this class, available on Thursday at conference for

anyone that needs it before this class.

Wildland S330 Taskforce/Strike Team Leader ~ Wednesday-Friday

Chad Calderwood, Doug Emmert, Ron Sipe, Jeff Ennega; Oregon Department of Forestry

Learn to recognize, plan and implement appropriate tactics in various incident situations with various resources and identify hazards and risks and mitigate them.

Day: 3 days—Wednesday, Thursday & Friday Class Size: Minimum 15, Maximum 25 students

Pre-requisites: Students will be required to sign up for this class no later than May 13, 2016 in order to complete the required precourse work. If class does not have a minimum of 15 students, class will be cancelled. The student has to have completed either their Engine Boss or Crew Boss task book with certification and completed S-215 and ICS 300.

High Angle Rope Rescue ~ Wednesday-Saturday

Jim Bolton, John Tish

This course will train firefighters and emergency responders in the use of rope, rescue equipment, and mechanical advantage systems for high-angle rescue environments. This course is applicable for rescuers seeking to initially acquire these skills, or to refresh and expand upon existing skills.

Days: 4 days—Wednesday, Thursday, Friday & Saturday

Class Size: 16 students maximum

The class will provide training listed in the DPSST Rescue Technician Task books in Chapters 4, 5 and meet requisite skill and knowledge required to be completed for Rope Rescue Technician Level 1. Once those task books are completed, the T.O. at the individuals department will have to sign off on the students task book and submit that to the State.

Requirements: Helmet, Boots, Clean gloves, Harness (Class 1 or 2), all weather clothing.

Swift Water Rescue ~ Thursday-Saturday

Lebanon Fire District John Tacy, Marshall Brookfield and members of Linn County SRT team

The water rescue class will be an knowledge based class. Participants will need to be in good physical condition with a ability to swim. PPE will not be provided. Participants will need a wet or dry suite. PFD with knife and whistle. Foot protection (hiking boots with wool socks can work) designed for water rescue. And water rescue helmet. The class will cover self-rescue, knots and rope systems for river rescue, shallow water crossings, and a rescue scenario.

Days: 3 days—Thursday, Friday & Saturday


